SCOUT NOTES

THE County Commissioner, Lieut.-Col. Leslie, occupied the chair at the Executive meeting on Friday. He informed the Local Association that Pontefract Association are making preparations for the forthcoming rally next July. There will be a camping site for 5,000, indoor accommodation for 1,000, and a plentiful supply of wood and water. He stressed the importance of all Scouts carrying staffs.

How oft are we to be reminded that the staff is an essential part of the uniform. The Chief Scout says that "a Scout without a staff is naked," yet there are far too many Scouts who ignore this. It is up to each Scout to possess one, and what is more, use it. There is no point in borrowing one. The Zulu warrior would not touch a borrowed Assagai; his pride is in possessing his own. Robin Hood, an excellent forester, used a staff. A legend tells us that he first met Little John on a narrow footbridge. There was no space for two to pass, and it was out of the question which would give way, so their staffs decided the question, the result being, Robin sitting in the stream. A great trumper of bygone days, St. Francis of Assisi, found the staff a great help on his long journeys. There is no need to point out the many useful services the staff performs, but I might add that decorating and carving designs on it is well spent time. You can make it an original record of your Scout work. The signs carved on would be known only to yourself, and it would become a treasured trophy recalling happy memories.

The Rovers have been busy at Notton during the past week ends, working on the water supply. The more hardy fellows have been going out on the Saturdays, and sleeping in the tool shed. The particular job in hand is trench digging, a not too pleasant job as they have to stand in the trench with water and mud well over their boot tops. Therefore there is a need for gum boots or waders; will anyone offer to give or lend, inform Mr. T. Pawsey, 35, Church Street.

The D.R.L. is drawing up a rota of workers for Notton, and is desirous of hearing from all Rovers who propose helping with the work. This is to prevent overlapping, and to organise the work thoroughly.

At the Annual Census the number of Scouts in the West Riding shows a marked increase on last year's figures. In our own Association there is urgent need of Akelas and Scouters, several troops being without responsible officers. A scheme is being launched whereby Rover instructors can step into the breach until officers can be found. The Annual Dinner has been fixed for Friday, December 2nd, and the Scout Association Dance is to be held in the Baths Hall in January.

The 9th Barnsley (St. Barnabas Church) Group held a successful Carnival Dance on Friday. They are to be congratulated, or envied, I can't decide which, on their troop headquarters, "The Scout Hut," situated in Harbro' Hills Road, where one can see the advantage of living in your own house. The hut, built by the troop, and being their own property, gives the right atmosphere and added interest to their work. It is the centre of great activity, each night being taken up with Scout work.

Last Monday night I found the pack in the midst of a happy meeting; 25 sturdy Cubs playing jungle games. The Group also contains 25 Scouts and 18 Rovers. The Rovers have been well in evidence at Notton recently. It is worth your while to pay them a visit, but don't come away without inspecting the Log Book.
