
"The Twentymen"

so a hunt for headquarters began




August 14th 1938

We received the honour of an invitation from St. George's Rover Crew to a Rover Moot at which Physical Training was discussed





Gallant rescue work was done




The weather cleared up on Sunday and some outlaws got loose




During the month of September

taken down




A new roof was put up

and finally painted






There were some very interesting speakers at the Annual Association meeting Oct 27th

after light refreshments






On November the 6th we tidied the den thoroughly and hid the rubbish

Early in November a strange periodical burst upon the unoffending scouts of the district. It was produced by one of our Rovers whose one idea is to remain completely anonymous.




November 13th 1939

crowded the premises out.



a grand Xmas Pantomime.



An Investiture


On December 27th 1939


On February 19th 1940




October 27th






